### Evaluation - Focus Group Discussions from Papua New Guinea

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#### IGAT Hope – Boroko, Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea

**Location:** Igat Hope office meeting room, Boroko, POM

**Participants:** 6: 1 female, 5 male

**Age:** 22-35 yrs

**Context:** all PLHIV. These are members who had all indicated that they had seen Love Patrol (at least some of the episodes) & were interested to come in for a FGD (note there was another large UN forum on this day which meant there were a lot of Igat Hope members attending that, so we didn't have as many at the FGD as we expected.

Rather than follow the format of the other FGD questions, we had a bit more of a free flowing discussion, allowing them to comment on LP2.

#### 1. What do you think of Love Patrol 2?

- I like it, I'm interested in it – every Sunday I'm wanting to watch it
- I've watched some episodes, not all, I don't have a TV, watch it on public TV (street canteen)
- This policeman – he's got family problems, with his wife
- Its very interesting – its real life, issues in the Melanesian culture, one thing I notice is that when we're watching, everyone's quiet, all the aunties, uncles & all the kids – they are so focused on it
- My family, when it comes to Sunday, they all sit and watch, then afterwards they ask me all these questions – it really gets them thinking & asking about HIV issues.
- A lot of young girls are watching it/ following it, talking about it – and talking about watching it the following week, talking about all the characters, they are really fans

#### 2. How did you feel after watching it?

- It helps me, it empowers me as a PLHIV
- One colour skin – in line with PNG, straight away it has my interest, come Sunday I must find a TV straight away to watch (because no TV in house)

#### 3. Which characters did you like & why?

- Like the policeman's wife – found out she was positive, strong in talking about her status, encouraged her husband to go for a test
- It doesn't make any difference in the characters – they're all good because its real life and they're all involved, it's real and about real things which are happening
- I liked the bus driver included – put in taxi drivers too as they are high risk

**4. Do you have any favourite parts/ storylines? (Which?) Why do you like those parts/ storylines?**

- I liked that she disclosed her status – this is good. And the husband disclosed his status finally – to family (her) first then out to the community (workplace) this is how it usually happens
- Mark – he was denying it, which is not good, but does happen. When he confesses in front of Elizabeth etc at AIDS alert – this is my favourite episode because he discloses
- Its educational in that some positive people do disclose, some deny or keep it to themselves
- He should have informed the wife about the unprotected sex, he should have said ‘we should go for a test’ – the audience are watching & knowing they themselves are guilty of doing this too!

**5. Do things like this happen in real life? (which things/ examples?)**

- Its what’s really happening in our country in relation to HIV
- Most people do these things everyday and they don’t realise but when they see it up there, they might think about what they’re doing & change, it makes them realise
- Message is very clear even though its done in Vanuatu – this is a daily thing happening because of the economic situation and the poverty, men have all the rights, violence against women, gender, all these things
- Gender is really involved in the first part of HIV transmission – men here control, make decisions
- Poverty, women & girls not properly respected within the family – not protected, not take care of the girls; it gives a good translation of this, even though it’s in English not Tok Pisin

**6. Any other comments you would like to make about Love Patrol?**

- The portrayal of the positive characters is good – seeing mark so healthy, he looks like anyone else – this reinforces that you cant tell if someone is positive
- Its so quiet in my family/ in my house while this show is on, while they are watching – they are very concentrated, one of my cousins from elementary school – after that this boy asked me/ told me ‘that lady has sick AIDS’ in Motu language (my language) – I was surprised he knew that
- Most of those watching are learning new things
- Young girls are watching at the public places and then afterwards discuss the movie
- I had 2 visitors with me one day – after watching the movie, they talked about/ asked how you can know if you have HIV – we talked about the blood test
- Its very informative, indirectly

- One thing – some of the kids don't understand because its in English – when 'Helen's story' was on TV, it was tok pisin so they love it

### **Suggestions**

- One thing – I haven't seen anything about VCT in there, it's important to have the VCT come in. Must show VCT first – suggest more on that, as it's the entry point & it would really help because many people in the provinces don't know about VCT
- Show how it happened to be contracted – include a clear reference to the fact that it was unprotected sex, show this in a VCT context
- If they could do it in pidgin? Because many people here are illiterate
- No MSMs, and it doesn't show families sitting around talking about sex
- HIV is not just general population – include MSM and more on sex workers, allow them to have input & stories to be relevant
- Violence (minister & wife) – expand more on that, violence against women eg. Back in the village women trying to use condom, husband stops her
- Gender – more on this – women not having rights, men have all the rights, have sex with someone else then come back and order the wife about
- Condoms – when asking if they can put in toilets in bar – need to hold up the condoms when talking about them, and also maybe pamphlets. Male & female condoms to be shown – need visuals for those who don't understand English
- Include an older person who gets positive (maybe an older man)
- Include soldiers, security guards – they are the gatekeepers to sex work, especially the security guards for the nightclubs
- Include mother to child transmission – she's pregnant, she goes to the clinic, tests positive & how the child can be prevented in getting HIV – cover all 3 (during pregnancy, delivery and breastfeeding)
- Include positive people meeting their peer groups – have a HIV+ network in it – see the ART clinic, do outreach (HIV+ people doing awareness)
- Show family support, community support & treatment (for PLHIV)
- Stigma & discrimination – when the positive woman is pregnant – loses support, family etc (show her experiencing stigma & discrimination), she loses everything then finds some support through maybe a women's service or something to help them
- Show churches to be more involved
- More on sex education – sex ed in the education curriculum – show more on this
- Youth groups involved, doing awareness, distributing IEC materials

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## **Kesi Community Youth – Boroko, Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea**

**Location:** CWA hall, Boroko, POM

**Participants:** 18: 10 female, 8 male.

**Age:** 15-25 yrs

**Context:** about half the group had seen LP2/ had been watching it (many didn't have TVs or power), others had heard of it. This is a youth group connected to the Red Cross. The organizer (Joe Mesa – Red Cross) said he had watched LP on TV on a trip to Bougainville & accurately recalled details from LP1 (not 2). Part way through one of the catering ladies joined in to give her opinion (she couldn't help herself!)

### **1. What happens in Love Patrol 2?**

- Something to do with love, around the community we live in, how people make love
- Man not faithful to his woman
- HIV – sick AIDS, the reality of HIV
- It shows that young people and some married people go around with other partners and this is how HIV is spreading, going around not using condoms
- Suppose you're not faithful, you are risking HIV

### **2. How did you feel after watching it?**

- I like to watch Love Patrol because I don't like to go to awareness, I hate to go & hear awareness, but in LP the acting is good & the message is there and stronger in the acting – I like to learn from watching drama
- Everyone must watch because it shows a good lifestyle, better way than rubis fasin
- Inside the movie – 'money talks' – shows the real things. There's impact in here – this is a way to educate people, especially for young people.
- That's the reality on family in PNG, within the household. The temptation, the money, the job
- The message in here is very clear
- It shows lack of communication
- Because it's a movie, it speaks one language, no matter which culture, which language – highlands, urban, rural, one language people can understand (the language of drama, of story)
- Young people want to be independent – not listen to parents, this is true and so they need to see LP to learn
- Its good that young people in urban areas & schools, church level, all levels need to see LP and have a chance to learn from it
- Dramatizing the real thing, the real stories, the stories talk to me

**3. Did you learn anything new from watching it (if yes, what? any new information in it? Something you didn't know before?)**

- Faithful, I learn I should be faithful to my girlfriend (maybe have 3 girlfriends before but now I learn I need to stick to one)
- I haven't seen it but I've heard about it & heard people talk about it. The DVD must be displayed/ shown by all family members, they all need to watch

**4. Which characters did you like & why (what is your favourite character?)?**

- The policeman – he's kind of funny (Edward) – too busy talking to his girlfriend to do his work
- Kalo & his friend getting into mischief
- The policewoman (Merrilyn) is a good actor,
- The police woman – I like her, she tells men the right things to do

**5. Which characters didn't you like & why?**

- The minister – he has a wife but he goes after other women, he has status but doing the wrong thing, he's not faithful, he has no respect
- The ministers wife because she went to the bar with another man, when her husband was not there
- John – he goes & sleeps with other women then goes back to his family – his boy is running around
- Some of the policemen – some of their attitudes, not responding to complaints, not attending to people
- There's no character or story I don't like – this movie is not just for us, its for the ministers, the politicians, & for the grassroots, There's a character/story aimed at every person in the community, that's why I like it all

**6. Do you have any favourite parts/ storylines? (Which?) Why do you like those parts/ storylines?**

- Elizabeth talking to the youth group
- Elizabeth coming out in the paper & mark getting a big shock but then he was trying to change things
- The ministers wife – being a strong woman & working with AIDS NGO & giving out condoms in bar. The minister came in & got the shock of his life
- The small boy following the big boys around all the time, good for young boys to watch, so they can see what can happen if you do this
- (Catering lady) I like it when they are coming up close to the point– when the face the problem – parents, children, police, magistrate.. it's the turning point, that's the learning point where it shows & when you're watching you think about what you are going to do when you come up against this
- I like the different levels – how they are dealing with things – law agencies, parents dealing with children, we're all facing these things



**7. Do things like this happen in real life? (which things/ examples?)**

- People getting HIV, yes it happens & happens like that
- HIV lady talking out - There are people talking out about having HIV here, before we didn't know there was HIV here
- Money man – business men, politicians etc looking for young girls
- Rape, stealing, drugs, it happens in our community in our city
- People not using condoms, not having safe sex
- People not being faithful
- Corrupt law enforcement agencies
- (caterer) Its not a movie – it's a true story - its happening in our family, in our community, in our nation, people using the daughter to support the family, they will deny its happening but it is, sending our children to the night club – not thinking of what this will mean & what it will bring
- the son's following daddy's footsteps, the son watches the daddy using the money, the phone for other women
- because of the high standard of the living, the big men, they give k50 to the young girl

**8. Did you discuss Love Patrol with anyone after you watched it? (If so, what did you talk about & with whom?)**

- Elizabeth talking about how she had HIV & how she got it – I talked my sistas, other girls about it, this was very touching to me, we talked about what we would do, who we would tell if it was us
- (caterer) in my family we're watching together, then after we're talking about sex, sex, sex – I'm talking to my son about safe sex, talking about "you see – see what can happen? 2 problems – a fatherless child & it can make you have AIDS" think twice before you have sex because this is what can happen. I talk with my daughter about relationships – behaviour of the father, communication, relationship between parents
- LP brings this learning in our small family

**9. Does it make you think differently about anything related to HIV/STI? (if yes, what?)**

- I don't want to go out & do it & then bring the sickness to my family. Not all the time yes, yes, now no, if yes then safe sex
- When you watch this movie, you think 'I can't do this' – I can't make decisions like they made, do things they do because I see what happens to them
- You can't tell by looking at someone – its in the blood & you can't see the blood
- Sharing with someone who has AIDS – trousers, shirts, food – I wasn't sure before, now I know and I want to take care of people who have it, give them things, care for them

**10. Does it make you want to do anything differently in your life? (if yes, what?)**

- (*caterer*) as a parent I want to talk to other parents about watching the movie, I'm gonna do a strong campaign to mothers and parents – if the parent can sort out in their own family. As parents we should encourage other parents to do the same
- (FGD coord) me as a parent, I should make the difference in my children's life
- me I'd like to tell stories about LP – some people in the community they see the movie but they don't understand the message – me I'm going to be the one who talks to them about the movie and talk about the story and make sure they understand the message (young man)
- I want to do peer education within my family to prevent this happening (young woman)

**11. Any other comments you would like to make about Love Patrol?**

- Make it longer! I want it on twice a week! And for longer (1hr) and I want to watch it next week, I'm sad its not going to be on.
- Q – when is the next series coming?
- All ages are watching – even 5, 6, 7 yrs are watching and its ok to watch for them, papa, mama, everyone
- If we watch every week, we see the mistakes
- I want them to continue this show, they need to keep watching (people in the community), I don't want it to stop! Its not enough 1 or 2 shows, the way to learn is for people to continue to watch, each week and there's always more young ones coming up who need to watch

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## **Lepufa Community – ATS settlement, Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea**

**Location:** On the outskirts of POM (other side of airport), the settlement has people from Oro province

**Participants:** 16: 9 female, 7 male.

**Age:** 18-25 yrs

**Context:** most of the group had seen LP2/ had been watching it, yet they have no power in this settlement. When asked how they watch it – they said they see it at the marketplace (where there's a TV, at the tucker box) or when they go into Moresby town for the weekend or they find a friend with power & TV.

### **1. What happens in Love Patrol 2?**

- Its about HIV
- A police officer having other sexual relationships, leading to family problems
- Its not just about HIV – its about all sorts of things & related issues (drugs like marijuana, alcohol, family violence etc) and generally lifestyle of the people in the Pacific.
- Using condoms stops HIV

### **2. How did you feel after watching it?**

- For married women – angry over man's behaviours (the police officer Mark) – men going out & doing what the want
- For young people – the issues is something to think about, young people making mistakes – it can effect your life
- There are some mistakes that you can correct though
- We learn from watching it and it assists us to change our behaviours
- Good show to educate family, friends etc
- Shows plenty risky behaviours e.g., this guy who goes out with all the different ladies

### **3. Did you learn anything new from watching it (if yes, what? any new information in it? Something you didn't know before?)**

- Simon's mother ended up being like a single parent – this is a type of child abuse, scenes of violence with Simon (child abuse)
- Many women find out about their husbands' behaviours after they get married
- Helps to identify the things that happen in marriages (married people to see what's good & what's best for marriages
- Violence
- Good educational show for youths
- Lessons learnt helpful

**4. Which characters did you like & why (what is your favourite character?)?**

- Elizabeth – she was so courageous to speak out

**5. Which characters didn't you like & why?**

- Mark – womanizing & passing HIV to his wife
- Rita – sex work (affairs with married men)
- Simon's father 'Rubis fasin'

**6. Do you have any favourite parts/ storylines? (Which?) Why do you like those parts/ storylines?**

- The police officer Mark, realizing he's HIV positive and starts regretting his past behaviours and changes his life and starts thinking about his wife & child

**7. Do things like this happen in real life? (Which things/ examples?)**

- Yes its everyday life, its Melanesian culture, same lifestyle, same way of thinking
- I think everyday I see these things happening e.g. Violence against women, this fella leaving the wife & child and going out to clubs looking for women
- Almost everything, every situation in the film is similar to PNG

**8. Did you discuss Love Patrol with anyone after you watched it? (If so, what did you talk about & with whom?)**

- Discussions with friends & peers about how HIV could be transmitted
- Watching with girls – talked about how you need to go check, you don't know if you have HIV or STI, you can't tell, you need to go check – I encouraged girls to do that
- Someone said they haven't watched it but if he had he would have encouraged others to be careful of risky behaviours, he has heard people talking about this show though

**9. Does it make you think differently about anything related to HIV/STI? (If yes, what?)**

- Think about how we must live a good life, be careful of how people behave
- Makes me think I don't want to go out with any woman!
- To be more careful of the husband, monitor the husbands/ boyfriends movements (NB: this was said by a male)
- Be faithful to one partner
- Money causes problems – having a lot of money and not using it in a good way can lead to risky behaviour
- Makes people realise what their risky behaviour could bring to life

**10. Does it make you want to do anything differently in your life? (If yes, what?)**

- Yes, as a married man it made me realise what risky behaviours could cause in my life,
- If (when) I am a married man I must stick with my wife (NB: said by unmarried young man)

- If I'm going to drink – stay at home, not go out to clubs where there's so much temptations, under the influence of alcohol the risky things people do
- Makes me think about the consequences of the different choices I could make – if I choose this road, this is what could happen, if I choose this other road, this is what happens
- Makes me want to think more about my family
- A split second decision or action can make you get HIV & its not worth it, I cant let this split second ruin my life
- Carry condoms!
- Helps us to identify help resources available
- Assist women to see where we can come in to assist our husbands and children

**11. Any other comments you would like to make about Love Patrol?**

- Good film, produce some more
- I think peoples lifestyles will change by watching it
- Wider coverage needed – I think we should have it in community outreach to use it right out in rural areas so most Papua New Guineans will see it
- Session 2 should be aired on EMTV once more
- In filming new ones, show some rural areas to, on the islands
- COME & FILM IN PNG!

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## Madang Youth, YOP Save the Children, Madang, Papua New Guinea

**Location:** Youth Friendly Centre (YFC), Youth Outreach Program (YOP), Madang

**Participants:** 10: 4 female, 6 male.

**Age:** 17-26 yrs

**Context:** about half the group had seen LP2/ had been watching it on TV, the other half had seen episodes at YFC the preceding Friday (shown during the regular Health Talk session held on Fridays). This is a group of youth who visit the Youth Friendly Centre as part of the Youth Outreach Program. The YOP use the LP1 materials extensively in their work, within the YFC and also in outreach.

### 1. What happens in Love Patrol 2?

- Its following the story of a man & woman with HIV, how its passed, a man bringing problems to the house
- Boyfriend and girlfriend problems, relationships, jealous men
- Illegal drugs, cocaine, heroin & the problems, smuggling drugs
- Older men looking for women – hotel, bar
- White man involved in the drug smuggling, drug deal
- Discrimination & stigma in the workplace - the man hasn't had a blood test but he thinks he might have HIV & the workmates are discriminating – the information is very clear
- The pastor is working hard telling community to live a good life, take care of each other
- Its about behaviour change, peer pressure – smoking, drugs, young fella missing school
- I want to know what's next!
- Drugs, relationships, HIV, how it affects the country
- VCT centre – counselor for HOV/STIs, the woman at the centre supported him, gave information
- A man shared his experience of having gonorrhoea, talked straight
- His wife came out & told story, it hurt the husband
- Drugs, alcohol, finance, HIV, it's a good one for young people to watch
- This issue AIDS – brings problems to women, to police – its effecting the policemen's work
- School girls & sex – its another problem, school girls should think about school but men are looking for the schoolgirls, like the bus driver
- Diseases pass through sex like HIV
- Policeman likes other police girl but she has security guard boyfriend, I think she likes him too, its going to bring problems, jealousy, fights

- The problems of HIV are inside the police station too, inside family & home, alcohol issues it produces problems in community, family

## **2. How did you feel after watching it?**

- Its educational but it depends on who is facilitating – if I take it to my community then afterwards I can do peer education – I would like to talk to them and ask them questions after they watch it
- Its educational because its real life situations
- It's a kind of behaviour change program
- I feel its real life – the drugs, HIV, alcohol – these things come up in my community
- It reminds me, those things that come up – they're true, true things that come up, workplace issues, faithfulness
- Story true – people watch & they see its true what they're doing in their life – its good to facilitate after so they see that
- Based on real life situations, something we experience, this sickness is not something that stays outside our community, its inside, because of those things
- Communication – it shows the problems, relationships issues
- I think they should use this CD inside schools, right from primary schools (and including high schools) I think in personal development, social science at high school. Life skills
- Corruption too its showing – drug dealings, the minister he was involved – that's not good, its happening though

## **3. Did you learn anything new from watching it (if yes, what? any new information in it? Something you didn't know before?)**

- How things can just happen – 2 guys exercising/ running but they found that bag of drugs and put their lives at risk. It reminded me again to look out, be aware of the risks, careful what you get yourself into.
- Dealings between white man & black man – drug dealings and how they work, how the white man made use of the black man, made me relies these things are happening in my country; money, drugs go together
- Policeman not being honest – we must be honest because what happened to him, his wife because he was not honest
- Behaviours inside hotels – sex workers trying to talk to men – need to be strong, policeman was concentrating on his work (phone call) & said no to girl
- When you talk drugs, you talk relationships, when talk drugs talk HIV – everything is related
- How you communicate with someone who has HIV (if you don't have HIV) how you treat them, care for them, inside the house
- Drugs – when they start small (young) it ruins school life, mental problems, mother doesn't want him involves (Simon) – how drugs can affect kids, what they effect in terms of influence, what kids can get involved with

#### **4. Which characters did you like & why (what is your favourite character?)?**

- Policeman (mark) who went to club – he behaved well
- Pastor – takes care of the community, pastor's wife gave to drunk's wife, pastor talked to drunk man, counseled him, he had a good effect on him – the drunk man then came and cried and said he'd change, he took in the ex-prisoner
- Mark – looking for drug dealers; even went after the white man
- Kalo & his friend – big part in the series – his friend saved his life, and I liked this storyline re the drugs, his wife also talked to him about his wife, letting her do the job – I liked that.
- The prisoner who came out who changed his life (jerry)
- I like all the characters
- I like Kalo's wife – the relationships side, the problems inside the relationship, the family, trying to sort out their problems
- Pastor's wife – taking care of people, the drunk man's wife, sharing food with her, looking out for the small boy (Simon), encourage daughter to go to school

#### **5. Which characters didn't you like & why?**

- Policeman who was brainwashing the other officer – negative (Robert?)
- Minister – 'hemi no mekim straet' he's sleeping with other women on the side, involved in corruption
- Security guard – he's jealous
- Truck driver (bus) going after the schoolgirls
- Big boys giving drugs to the small boy
- Minister's wife – fighting, yelling at mark when he told he was HIV, she was cross at him instead of giving support
- Kalo he's hiding something from his wife (drugs) – he puts her at risk. Not thinking about his relationship – brings big problem to the house. Not letting his wife get job but he doesn't get job, he's cross at her for trying. Problems start when man & woman fight, and he goes walkabout.
- Drug boy – looking for Kalo, hurt his wife, sneaky – he asks the friends how to find Kalo
- Drunk man he drinks beers, doesn't think about wife, boy, no food because he spends money on beer
- Wife of mark – because she spoke out and caused problem for him in his workplace
- Don't like female officer & mark thinking/ doing personal things inside work – that's how corruption starts, work is work, shouldn't be off doing/ thinking personal things



**6. Do you have any favourite parts/ storylines? (Which?) Why do you like those parts/ storylines?**

- Part where mark talked to his wife on the phone – she’s crying; then he got counseling and he decided to test and to speak out – he overcame all his fear and problems
- Counseling part is important part of people living with HIV – counseling section I like
- Pastor’s wife – where she left the house & helped the small boy, bought him food, then where she had money stolen
- Kalo & his friend – where tony saved kalo – followed him, saved his life
- Where kalo changed his mind re. Wendy & when he said sorry to her

**7. Do things like this happen in real life? (which things/ examples?)**

- ‘Fasin lo boy’ – smoke drugs, small boys smoke drugs, talk rude at girls
- kalo & his wife – those issues/ fights in a relationship – this is real life, also him going off with friends all the time and she has to stay home. Also it was his friend who talked to him & changed his mind (influence of friends on young men’s attitudes, helps them to change)
- I think its all real life
- What happened inside the club – married men going out & girls there, girls coming up to them, men buying them drinks
- Drug abuse – this is real life here now
- The fashion of the security guard – he thinks he can do what he wants & then he is jealous. Kalo too, how he is to Wendy re, jealous and not letting her work, fighting, dragging her out of bar – this is the true fashion here with men
- Sex workers inside hotel – its happening inside out community
- Church – it was a youth group, but where is the rest of the congregation? Inside the churches are empty, young people interested but not too much (but in the film, the pastor doesn’t give up – still helps community)
- School children involved in drugs
- Drug smuggling – in PNG too we have this, kidnapping too

**8. Did you discuss Love Patrol with anyone after you watched it? (If so, what did you talk about & with whom?)**

- Talked to some of the youth outreach program volunteers, we discussed about kalo & wendy and their relationship; also about mark and his wife – how he had a blood test, he was HIV+, I used that example to talk about testing, he was a true positive
- The drug story and the girls’ involvement and how many men were involved (including the minister) – I talked to some street boys about this (peer ed)
- Jealous men’s attitudes, and the drug story
- I would like to use the CD as a basis to do some peer ed, activities and discussion

- I talked to men in my street about marks story, the sex workers in the bar, many stories from the film

**9. Does it make you think differently about anything related to HIV/STI? (if yes, what?)**

- HIV – its not just about condoms – all those things come up, VCT access, issues in family etc
- Boys & drugs – how drugs relate to HIV, drugs can lead into getting HIV
- Alcohol & HIV – men drinking and the problems – out drinking in the nightclubs. Alcohol is a big part of risk – drink, drink then go with women, sex workers
- Risk from the blood from the drug guy (he was dripping blood) – his blood could get on wendy & if she has a cut or something it could pass
- The 2 schoolgirls – they don't have correct/much information about HIV & because of that they are at risk. The driver trying to het the girl, she doesn't realise what the risk is, what he wants, she's young
- That policemen too can be involved and infected
- Big man – their role, they are paying for the drinks for the sex workers, no respect for the policeman
- Relationships – kalo & wendy – they are cross and fight, then he walks off, what he might do
- Drunk man (john) – going out with these different women, bringing it back to family. This is reality – the man going round, but the wife is faithful woman in the church but she ends up with HIV (and children too)

**10. Does it make you want to do anything differently in your life? (if yes, what?)**

- Stay true to myself, self respect, if your involved in a group, make your own decision, stay strong, be a good role model, I try to be a role model to those around me
- Makes me want to speak out about any kind of corruption
- Have good relationships, you must help people
- Stay true to our partner
- Stay away from jealousy
- Treat all women well, respect them
- Be aware of bullying
- Not too much alcohol
- You must understand people, makes me think about how I treat people and how I should treat people
- Schoolchildren – encourage them to go to school, support them to stay in school, life for children left at home, in house is not good – that's where it starts, the problems
- Makes me think that once I get married I must think first of my wife, my family. Fashion of single man must be different to fashion of married man, it changed mindset blo me

- Discrimination – plenty of people react badly and their attitude is bad – made me aware of how I act to people, the type of treatment we give people, how it discriminates them
- The kinds of things men do, Women do too
- When you talk to a girl you must talk straight

**11. Any other comments you would like to make about Love Patrol?**

- Goodfella CD, educational CD, but plenty people don't have electricity – good to distribute it, share this information, lets advocate what is on this CD – to church group, youth group – tell the stories that are inside
- Promotion team – awareness, talk to governors, inside community, what the CD is trying to tell us
- I would like to see teen pregnancy included, unwanted pregnancy as that is a very big & common issue here
- We need this at school because by the time they leave school all could have happened – so many young girls, these things happen to them while they're still at school
- I think Love Patrol should go on, not stop! We must start from 1 and go through and see all because its very good, educational
- We want PNG actors – we can act in this movie too – or we can do dramas and act out the stories, the things that come up here & discuss
- We need to make chances for the youths to watch – they need to learn these things, when we travel around if we can promote this one
